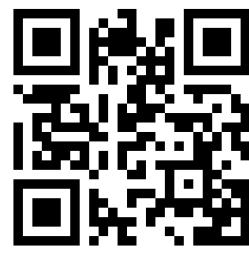


The Kitchener Consumption and Treatment Services (CTS) site at 150 Duke Street West will close on March 31, 2025.

Beginning on April 1, 2025 there will be no services provided at this address.



Without CTS,

more overdoses may happen in public spaces.

What can you do?

Know the signs of an opioid overdose.



Cannot be woken up or not moving



Pupils extremely small



Cold or clammy skin



Dizziness and disorientation



Breathing slow or absent



Choking, or coughing, gurgling, or snoring sounds



Discolouration of lips, nails, or skin

If you witness an overdose **call 911** immediately. If possible stay with the person.

Canada's *Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act* provides protection against charges for possession of drugs for personal use if seeking medical help for yourself or someone else who has overdosed.

Carry and know how to use naloxone.

Naloxone (also called **Narcan**) is a medication that temporarily reverses an opioid overdose.

Naloxone is available for free and without prescription at your local pharmacy or from various community agencies.

Subscribe to overdose alerts from the Overdose Monitoring, Alert, and Response System (OMARS) to know when there is increased risk of overdose in the community.
